- Refresh of the National Autism Strategy due in late 2019 (adults & children)
- National Research Strategy for Autism and Learning Disability due in 2020

# Could we improve policy and outcomes for all neurodevelopmental conditions?

Traditionally viewed as a hugely varied set of discrete conditions: autism, ADHD, learning disability, Tourette's, OCD, epilepsy, dyslexia, dyspraxia, speech and language disorders, genetic syndromes...

But having more than one NDC is the norm, not the exception

Research shows overlapping biomarkers from genetics and neuroimaging through to behaviour across NDCs but biomarkers within disorders lack sensitivity and specificity

All NDCs are under-funded, under-resourced, under-researched and all have poor outcomes across health, education, QoL etc

## **Embracing Complexity**

- Charities and organisations spanning neurodevelopmental conditions
- Collaboration, not competition
- Led by the views of the people we serve
- Starting a new dialogue about how we diagnose, support and improve outcomes for everyone with NDCs across the lifespan
  - Multi-diagnostic pathways
  - Better training, reasonable adjustments and proactive support
  - Research to understand the true overlap between NDCs and find new ways to deliver more joined-up diagnosis and services





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
